Weapon Wear Conditions

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, very little scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight blemishes)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear and tear)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant scratches and fading)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely worn, often amusing textures)

A skin like the *AWP|Asiimov* looks totally various in Field-Tested condition compared to Battle-Scarred, significantly altering its market price.

Why Do Players Open Cases?

With such low mathematical chances of earning a profit, why **CSGO Case Opening** do countless dollars worth of cases get opened on a monthly basis? The phenomenon can be associated to a number of mental and cultural elements:
