The Mechanics Behind the Scenes: Provably Fair Gaming

To fight uncertainty and construct trust among users, reputable CSGO gambling sites carry out a system called **Provably Fair**.

This cryptographic technology allows players to independently confirm that the outcome of every game is really random and has not been manipulated by the house.

- **How it works:** Before a round begins, the server generates a secret "server seed" and hashes it, showing the hash to the gamer. The gamer's web browser produces a "customer seed." When integrated with a nonce (a counter), these three aspects identify the video game result.
- **Confirmation:** After the round concludes, the unhashed server seed is exposed. Players can plug these variables into a confirmation tool to show the house didn't change the result midway through.
