1. Repairing a Sagging Door

- **Step 4:** Once dry, trim the wood flush with the surface.
- **Step 5:** Reattach the hinge utilizing longer screws that can bite into the stud behind the door frame.

2. Removing Squeaks

This is the most convenient repair in home maintenance.

- Unlock and tap the hinge pin up utilizing a nail and a hammer.
- Clean the pin clean with a rag to remove old, filthy grease.
- Coat the pin lightly with a multi-purpose lube or petroleum jelly.
- Reinsert the pin and swing the door backward and forward a few times to distribute the lube.

3. Changing a Misaligned Latch

If your door declines to remain shut, the lock isn't aligning properly with the hole in the strike plate.

- **The Lipstick Trick:** Rub a bit of lipstick or chalk on the door lock. Shut the door and attempt to lock it. The mark left behind on the door frame will show you precisely where the lock is hitting.
- **The Fix:** Use a file to expand the strike plate hole, or unscrew the strike plate and move it a little up or to match the lock.
