- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, sometimes revealing totally different textures)

Certain skins look incredible even in Battle-Scarred condition (frequently called "blackimovs"), while others look terrible unless they are Factory New. Drift worth plays an enormous function in determining a product's secondary market value.
