In older homes especially, the tank might be much closer to the house than individuals think.

The appeal of probing is that you are not searching for the entire storage tank at the same time. You are reading hints. A stronger surface below. A hollow noise there. A line of disturbed soil. A straight run from your house drain line. Piece by piece, the area discloses itself.

Before you touch the ground, pile the probabilities in your favor

The greatest error I see is beginning in the center of the lawn with no plan. A smarter method is to treat the probe pole as the final validating tool, not the very first thinking tool.

Tip 1 is to start at the house and recognize the primary sewer exit if you can. In a cellar, crawlspace, or piece edge, the major drain line usually tells you the direction toward the septic tank.

Tip 2 is to inspect any kind of as-built illustrations, examination records, or pumping invoices. Even a draft from a previous owner can save an hour.

Tip 3 is to search for the cleanout. Exterior cleanouts typically associate the building sewer, which gives you a straight course outward.

Good installers hide septic tanks, however they rarely make them mystical. Tanks need gain access to, useful pipeline runs, and sensible placement far from wells, foundations, and home lines. If you slow down and read the site, the likely area starts to narrow fast.

Tip 6 is to seek refined anxieties. Over time, soil over a tank can resolve a little, specifically if it was backfilled loosely.

Tip 7 is to watch for greener or earlier-growing lawn in one band. Wetness patterns can expose trenches and disrupted soil.

Now the amazing component. Probing is a skill, and the even more purposeful you are, the more useful the feedback becomes. Knocking the rod into the ground tells you much less than a regulated push.

Tip 11 is to wear gloves with excellent grip. You wish to feel modifications with the rod, not combat with sweaty palms.

Tip 12 is to maintain the pole virtually upright. Tilted penetrating can glimpse off things and mislead you.

Tip 13 is to use steady pressure rather than jabbing hard. A sluggish press offers far better responsive feedback.

Tip 14 is to probe in a grid pattern once you have a most likely location. Random pokes lose time and make patterns harder to see.

Tip 15 is to note each dubious call point with a flag or little paint dot so you can map the shape.

When the probe relocates with regular soil, the resistance tends to feel regular. When it gets in gravel, you really feel a chattery crisis. When it strikes a storage tank cover or tank top, the stop really feels wider and extra last.

Rocks can imitate that in the beginning, but rocks often tend to have smaller footprints and uneven sides. A container leading offers repeated confirmation over a bigger area.

Finding the line first often finds the container second

Many storage tanks end up being much easier to situate if you initially find the drain pipeline. That pipe leads you home.

Tip 16 is to start penetrating a number of feet outside your home according to the structure sewer.

Tip 17 is to function outside basically intervals, seeking a slim band of easier probing or pipeline call at a regular depth.

Tip 18 is to remember that the pipeline ought to run fairly right, though small bends happen.

Once you assume you have discovered the storage tank top, resist the urge to dig immediately. Invest 10 more mins verifying the form. Those ten mins can save a great deal of unneeded digging.

Tip 26 is to probe in a widening ring around the very first solid contact.

Tip 27 is to locate a minimum of 2 sides before calling it confirmed.

Tip 28 is to approximate the container dimensions. Many residential tanks are approximately rectangular and generally somewhere around 4 to 6 feet wide and 8 to 12 feet long, though there is a lot of variation.

Tip 29 is to note the corners as ideal you can based upon where the broad solid contact ends.

Tip 30 is to seek the inlet side closest to the house and the electrical outlet side leading toward the drainfield.

Tip [sliding ground rod](#) 38 is to never ever go into a septic tank under any scenarios. Harmful gases and oxygen-poor air can eliminate quickly.

Tip 39 is to quit if your probe captures electrical wiring, unidentified piping, or anything that does not fit the expected layout.

Tip 40 is to call a septic professional if the container shows **Mighty Probe** up uncommonly deep, unattainable, or structurally questionable.

1. Locate most likely drain line direction from the house.

3. Probe gradually and mark every solid contact.
