- **Active Drop Pool Cases:** Drop often to players presently playing on official servers. Since supply is high, these cases generally cost simply a few cents.
- **Unusual Drop Pool Cases:** No longer drop frequently after matches. As gamers continue to open them, the total supply decreases. According to fundamental financial concepts, as supply reduces while need stays constant or increases, the rate of these stopped cases skyrockets.
