This is the most typical condition in the market. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear; paint is noticeably chipped and dull in significant locations. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Heavy wear. The weapon looks greatly weathered, rusted, or battered. (Note: Some skins look distinctively "cool" or "blackened-out" in high float BS).

It deserves noting that some skins are hardcoded to never appear in certain conditions. For example, a particular skin may only exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are categorized into different rarity tiers, which determine how hard they are to get through random case drops or trade-ups.

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, standard weapon finishes.
