

Garden City rarely announces itself in the dramatic way larger cities do. It does not need to. Set along the Boise River and threaded through a mix of industrial corridors, neighborhood streets, tasting rooms, art spaces, and small businesses, it has grown into one of the most distinctive pockets in the Treasure Valley. People who know the area tend to describe it the same way: compact, creative, a little gritty in the best sense, and full of places that reveal themselves slowly.
