Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful, perfect finish with little to no scratches.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Extremely small blemishes, generally near the edges or barrel.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear, scratches, and fading. The most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Significant wear, heavy scratching, and visible paint chipping.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Extremely used, rusted, or faded. Often valued for unique "blackimov" effects.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," meaning they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variations remarkably unusual and pricey.
