The Rarity System

Every skin inside a case belongs to a particular rarity tier. These tiers determine the possibility of getting the product and its possible value.

percentages above represent the "base" chance per opening. The real "Blue Gems" (Gold tier) are incredibly rare, typically estimated at less than 0.0001% for particular high-tier knives.

How the Opening Mechanic Works

When a player clicks "Unlock," the game produces a random number. This number associates to a specific product within the case's pool.

Drift Value & StatTrak

A crucial consider identifying a skin's worth is its **Float Value**. This is a number in between 0 and 1 that represents the wear and tear of the weapon:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 - 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07 - 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15 - 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38 - 0.45

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 - 1.00

Additionally, some skins feature a **StatTrak™** counter, tracking the number of eliminates made with that weapon. StatTrak variations are generally more expensive than their standard equivalents.

One of the most Popular and Valuable Cases

Not all cases are produced equivalent. Older cases, or those including legendary skins like the "Fade" or "Case Hardened" Blue Gems, command astronomical prices on the Steam Community Market.

Leading 5 Most Expensive Cases

1. **The CS: GO Weapon Case # 1:** The initial case. Rates fluctuate heavily however are typically really high due to fond memories.
2. **The eSports 2013 Case:** Contains the iconic Howl.
3. **The Revolver Case:** Contains the R8 Revolver|Fade.
4. **The Operation Wildfire Case:** Introduced the Fire Serpent collection.
5. **The Clutch Case:** Known for important Gamma Doppler knives.

Costs are subject to market volatility and change daily.

Is It Worth Opening Cases?

This is the most typical concern asked by brand-new gamers. Statistically, the anticipated value of the skins you receive is usually lower than the expense of the secret plus the case.

- **Average Cost to Open:** £ 3.00 (Key) + £ 0.50 (Case) = **£ 3.50**
- **Typical Return:** Typically hovers around £ 0.80 to £ 1.50, meaning your house (Valve) and the market generally profit.

The majority of players will receive "scrap" (Consumer or Mil-Spec skins) worth pennies. Nevertheless, the adventure of the "roll" and the possibility of landing a Covert or Gold product keeps the economy alive. For financial investment purposes, purchasing the case straight is frequently more secure than spending for the key to open it.

1. Where can I purchase cases?

You can purchase cases straight from the "Get" area in the CS: GO main menu, or you can acquire them from the Steam Community Market for a variable cost.

2. Can I trade up for a case?

Yes. You can trade up 10 items of a lower tier to receive one item of the next tier (as much as Covert), or you can use the "Trade Up Contract" to switch lower-tier products for weapon cases in some circumstances.

3. What takes place to the "Gold" items?

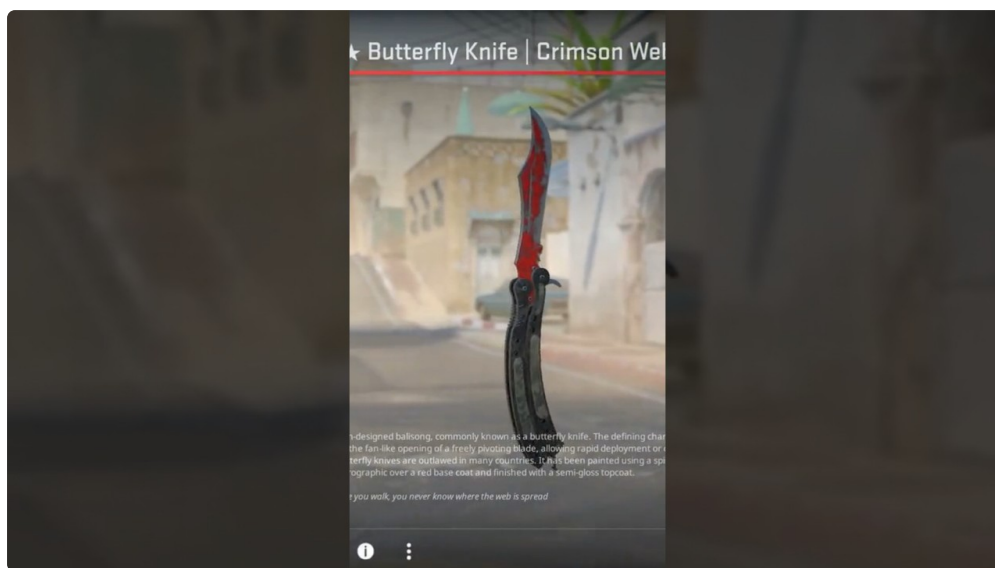
Gold products (Knives and Gloves) are the rarest finds. They are tradable and can be sold on the Steam Market genuine cash (after a 7-day trade hold).

4. Do cases disappear if not opened?

No, cases in your stock do not expire. You can hold onto them forever.

5. Why do some cases cost more than others?

Supply and demand. Older cases are no longer visited the game, making them scarce. If they contain a preferable skin (like the R8 Fade), the price remains high due to rarity.

While opening them is hardly ever a sound financial choice, the system provides a layer of enjoyment that has kept the Counter-Strike community engaged for over a years.
