- **Delayed Medical Checks:** Thorough examinations can be hard to complete in a condensed timeframe.
- **Paperwork & Regulatory Compliance:** Securing international clearance and approvals from federations and UEFA can lag behind the final signing moments.
- **Strategic Squad Decisions:** Clubs want to ensure that every gesture, especially with a €50m investment, maximizes the player's long-term impact rather than rushing their debut in high-stakes matches.
