1. Changing Worn Weatherstripping

Breezy windows are often the result of flattened or missing out on weatherstripping.

- **Step 1:** Put on heavy-duty work gloves and safety glasses. Carefully get rid of all damaged glass fragments from the frame.
- **Step 2:** Scrape away the old glazing putty and remove the metal sparkles holding the glass in place.
- **Step 3:** Measure the opening and cut a brand-new piece of glass (or have a hardware store sufficed) a little smaller than the opening.
- **Step 4:** Apply a fresh bed of glazing putty to the rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
- **Step 5:** Press the glass securely into the putty, secure it with new glazing points, and use a bevel of putty around the outside edge. Paint once dry.

Preventive Maintenance: How to Make Your Windows Last

The finest window repair is the one you never ever need to make. Routine upkeep can considerably extend the life-span of windows:

- **Clean Regularly:** Wipe down tracks, frames, and glass a minimum of two times a year to avoid dirt buildup that causes jams.

- **Lube Moving Parts:** Apply a light lubricant to hinges, locks, and moving tracks when a year.
