

Fife is one of those South Sound cities that people often drive through without realizing how much is tucked into its small [HOME — Renovation & Design Build](#) footprint. It sits in a practical spot, close to Tacoma, Puyallup, and the industrial corridors that have shaped the region for decades, yet it still has a local personality that shows up in its parks, its event calendar, and the way longtime residents talk about the place.
