

Tequesta is the kind of place that rewards slower eyes. It does not try to impress you all at once. Instead, it reveals itself in layers, through river bends, old Florida shade trees, a marina at the right hour of the day, and neighborhoods where people actually notice how a house sits on its lot and how a room handles the afternoon light.
