- **The Moonshot (High Multiplier Chase)**

- *How it works:* Placing small bets and claiming enormous multipliers (50x, 100x, or more).
- *Pros:* Extremely high payments for a very small initial danger.
- *Cons:* Statistically rare occasions; the likelihood of losing the stake is incredibly high.
