Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious scratches and wear, but the artwork stays largely undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Significant wear, heavy scratches, and noticeable paint fading.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavily distressed, rusted, or scraped; often looked for after for distinct appearances.

Beyond outside wear, skins can likewise have a **StatTrak**™ module (which tracks verified eliminates with that specific weapon, marked by a little digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped throughout official Valve-sponsored esports competitions, including gold team and occasion sticker labels).

The CS2 economy works much like a real-world stock market. Costs are determined entirely by supply and demand, rarity, and neighborhood perception.

4. **Float Extremes:** Some collectors pay enormous premiums for products with extremely low float values (e.g., 0.000 x) or exceptionally high drifts where the weapon looks totally rusted away (understood as "Blackiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

Popular Platforms for Trading and Buying

While players can purchase and sell items straight on the official **Steam Community Market**, funds are locked within the Steam environment and can not be squandered to a bank account. Consequently, a robust third-party ecosystem has emerged.

- **Steam Community Market:** Safest for casual users; deals use Steam Wallet funds.
