- **Fracture Case (2020):** Known for introducing the Shattered Web knives into regular drop swimming pools, making popular styles more accessible.

- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, sometimes revealing totally various textures)

Certain skins look extraordinary even in Battle-Scarred condition (typically called "blackimovs"), while others look horrible unless they are Factory New. Drift worth plays an enormous role in figuring out a product's secondary market value.
