The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

One of the most fascinating elements of CS: GO skins is that no 2 similar weapons look exactly the same. Every weapon is designated a **Float Value** ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical condition or outside wear.

The wear value is permanently locked to the item when it is generated and does not break down further through usage.

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Pristine, flawless finish with minimal to no scratches.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Minor acnes or small scuffs, typically only noticeable upon close examination.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Visible wear and scratches, balancing affordability and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Substantial paint cracking and heavy wear patterns.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Greatly degraded, in some cases looking rusted, weathered, or practically totally stripped of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the famous AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their most affordable possible wear states exceptionally unusual and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital possessions operates similarly to a real-world stock exchange. Rates are determined purely by supply and demand, affected by several essential factors:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports professional starts utilizing a particular skin during a significant tournament, the demand for that item normally surges over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping certain older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins included within them-- dwindles, causing costs to rise naturally in time.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next higher tier, burning items out of flow and completely changing supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations present brand-new thematic collections, briefly flooding or moving the focus of the marketplace.
